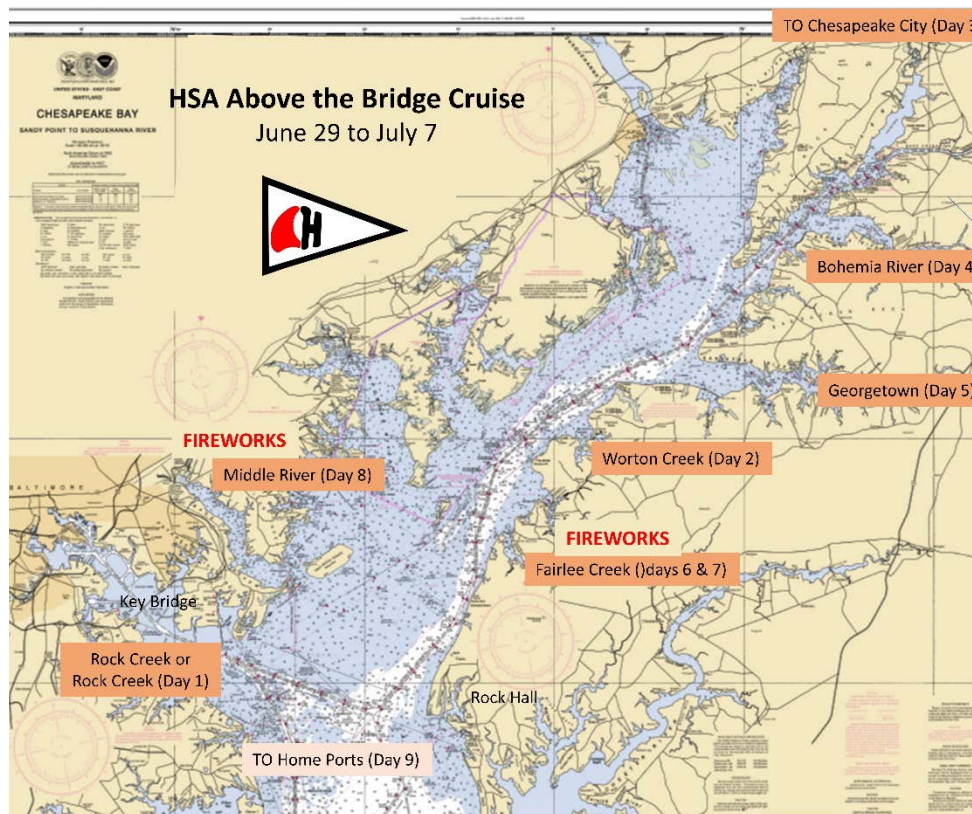
We are pretty far along with plans for our first week-long cruise in a few years.

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Comments about the ports of call

We will visit several great north-of-the Bridge spots that will be new to many of our members. Join the cruise and experience these wonderful destinations.

Worton Creek (Day 2)

While we plan to anchor out, there are two marinas that accommodate transients. According to *Cruising the Chesapeake; a Gunkholer's Guide*, swimming and beachcombing are excellent and you can dive off a sandy spit into deep water, but watch for passing boat traffic.

Chesapeake City (Day 3)

This historic village on the banks of the C&D Canal offers restaurants, a museum and dockage. It marks the northern terminus of our cruise

Bohemia River (Day 4)

We'll anchor in Veazey Cove near the mouth of the river. Some in the club remember this as a great place to stop for the night and take a swim on a hot summer day after transiting up Delaware Bay and the C&D Canal. Other will get to enjoy it for the first time.

Georgetown (Day 5)

Nine miles up the Sassafras River lies Georgetown. While there is limited anchorage, we expect most of our fleet to make it a marina night; a chance to recharge, maybe buy ice, and go ashore.

Fairlee Creek (Day 6 & 7) Independence Day **FIREWORKS**

Great Oak Landing Marina puts on a huge 4th of July fireworks display and we will see it! While there will be over 100 boats in the harbor, we'll find a place to raft up then dinghy ashore for the fireworks and maybe the Tiki Bar. If you want a slip in the Marina, call soon [410-778-5007]. They will fill up fast!

We are also planning a lay day in Fairlee Creek for Friday, the fifth.

Middle River (Day 8) **FIREWORKS**

The Baltimore County Marine Trade Association puts on an outstanding fireworks display on the Middle River. As the plan stands now, we'll raft up in a cove off of Frog Mortar Creek. It's a spectacular show and on-water party.

The Last Day (Day 9)

All good things must come to an end. On Sunday morning we'll head home. Even Herrington Harbor North tucked way up in Herring Bay is only 41 miles away. It might require some Yanmar help to go that far, but the whole way home you can think about the eight days of less than 25 miles that let you sail virtually the whole week.
